

RESOLUTION 24-130

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF SPRING HILL, TENNESSEE TO DESIGNATE PROPERTY LOCATED AT 2468 DEPOT STREET AS A HISTORICALLY SIGNIFICANT SITE

WHEREAS, it is the policy of the City of Spring Hill to promote the preservation and protection of the physical character and quality of life in the city; to promote the educational, cultural civic awareness and general welfare of the city while providing a sense of commitment and continuity between the past and present through the encouragement of preservation and protection of historically significant sites and structures; and to foster civic pride and historic recognition through the preservation of the City's heritage; and

WHEREAS, Roman Panczczko owner of the property at 2468 Depot Street commonly known as Dalton's Store pursuant to Title 2, Chapter 4, Section 2-405(2)(d) of the City of Spring Hill Municipal Code, has requested that this site be designated by the City of Spring Hill as a Historically Significant Site.


WHEREAS, Title 2, Chapter 4, Section 2-406 of the City of Spring Hill Municipal Code provides that sites in the City of Spring Hill will be designated as Historically Significant Sites by resolution of the Board of Mayor and Aldermen upon recommendation of the City of Spring Hill Historic Commission; and

WHEREAS, the City of Spring Hill Historic Commission has recommended this site for such designation having met the Criteria for Designation of Historically Significant Sites as defined in Title 2, Chapter 4, Section 2-407 of the City of Spring Hill Municipal Code.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Spring Hill, Tennessee that the property located at 2468 Depot Street commonly known as Dalton's Store is hereby designated as a Historically Significant Site.



Subject: BOMA Agenda Request from the Historic Commission - Designating Dalton's Store, 2468 Depot Street as Historically Significant

April,

On March 26, 2024, the Historic Commission received a request from Roman Paneczko to have the city formally designate 2468 Depot Street, Maury County Tax Map 025P Parcel 011.00 as a Historically Significant Site. On May 9, 2024, the City of Spring Hill Historic Commission did consider this request and has recommended that the BOMA designate the property at 2468 Depot Street also known as Dalton's Store as a Historically Significant Site.

Pursuant to Title 2, Chapter 4, Section 2-406 of the City of Spring Hill Municipal Code, as Chairman of the City of Spring Hill Historic Commission, I would request that a resolution be prepared for consideration by the Board of Mayor and Aldermen.

5/24 Recollections of Alice Dalton Pierce

DALTON BROS GROCERY

Depot Street

My first memory of the old store was of my aunt bringing me there before school and the good cold, chocolate milk she always gave me. It was "Kinnard's Grocery" then, run by my dad's sister and her husband and she would go in early to open up. I was the oldest of three and our parents had to do the daily milking and get it out to be picked up. Someone would take me to school closer to the eight o'clock bell. A few years later my parents bought the store and it became "Dalton's Grocery." "Kinnards Grocery" moved uptown.

I remember the layout of the store: a glass candy case (A bar of candy was 5 cents) on the left as you entered, an ice cream box and a drink box further down toward the back, the service counter in between with its adding machine and wooden cash drawer. There was a huge roll of meat-wrapping paper attached to the left end of the counter. We older girls, when we began to help out in the store during our high school days, learned the art of ripping off just the right amount of paper and carefully wrapping a customer's selection of beef or pork. Canned goods and other things were shelved on the right side of the store, along with fresh fruit in baskets on the floor and of little interest to me as a teenager. Racks held fresh bread brought in daily. I recall that the front door had a small Colonial or Taystee sign on it

The meat counter was a visual divide, as well as physical, between the main part of the store and the small area in back that housed a large, mountainously heavy, round of huge tree trunk known as a "meat block" where the meat was cut as it was sold. There was a small coal-burning stove. A dial telephone hung on the wall. To the left of the phone was a door which led into an elongated room on the side of the store that we called the "back room." This room ran the length of the store, front to back and housed delivery items that were yet to be put up, as well as large sacks of feed and bags of flour in the front section. There was a large feed scale close to a small front entrance to the right of the main door. A farmer could back up to the end of the porch and have his feed loaded. People also brought in their eggs to sell and Dad had put an "egg candler" on the wall in there. This was a box with a light bulb inside and two holes in front that he could put the eggs against and check to be sure they were still good.

Back inside the main part of the store was a back door leading onto a stamp-size porch and out into the small yard. The store yard adjoined the yard of the house next door where we lived. When we first bought the store, there was only the store building with its inventory, and a shed. We actually lived in the side or "back room" while the house was being built on the lot next door. (I don't know how! But there were five of us and we did!!!) I was about six; my sisters, five and three.

I remember the sound of the old ceiling fan as it whirred away in the summer; I can recall the smell of the wood floor when Daddy oiled it down and the thrill of us each getting our own

individual candy bar when we first got the store and later, after it became Dalton Bros. and I was old enough to help, sitting on the front porch with Uncle Bruce and sharing snacks. I remember the sound of cars and trucks scrunching on the graveled drive of the store yard on summer nights, as they came, one after the other, to get their groceries for the week. Sounds of the Grand Ole Opry would often carry through the dark. It was a comfortable, casual time when the farmers and their wives drove into town after the week's work to meet up with friends and pick up their groceries for the week to come.

From my perspective, back then, all was right with the world.



David and Mattie Harris Dalton

David Wilson Dalton was born on Christmas Day 1915 in Theta, TN and was the last of five children born to Robert and Ora Goad Dalton. His father ran a butcher shop in Theta and David's family lived on Knob Creek Road. When David was nine months old, they moved to Spring Hill after his father moved his butcher shop there. David and Mattie's daughter, Anne, related this story that her father once told her: "David once commented that he remembered his father coming home each day bringing a package of meat for his mother to cook the next day. Then one day he came home and said he had sold the meat market. He said some man asked what he would take for it and he named a price that he was sure he wouldn't pay, but the man took him up on it. David, being a small boy thought "We won't have meat anymore."

His family would live a short time at a house on Maury Hill Street in Spring Hill, but soon after moved to a house on Depot Street that once stood two lots up from where the road intersects Beechcroft. Years later the house burned after sparks from their neighbor's house landed on the roof. David's father passed away in 1928, and after his death, David told his mother he would always take care of her. He kept that promise until her death in 1970.

Mattie Louise Harris was born on January 19, 1914 in the Port Royal Community. She was the youngest child born to George Ephraim and Ella Ann Dodson Harris. Mattie was five days old when her mother died. Her mother's death certificate says she died from premature labor caused by an attack of asthmas, but the family has always said she died as a result of blood poisoning since the doctor had just come from treating a boy with an infected foot before delivering Mattie. Their daughter Anne shared this: "Mattie Lou was tiny and her grandmother was afraid she wouldn't live and thought if she couldn't live it might be better to go ahead so she could be buried with her mother. She lived exactly 97 years to the day that her mother died."

Mattie and her family lived with her grandparents at their family home of "Brittain," that was located near where modern-day Tom Lunn Road and Rice Road intersect. When her father remarried, they moved to the tenant house located where Dove Court is now. When Mattie was older, her cousin Charles "Buddy" Harris, who was several years younger than her, remembers Mattie Lou staying with his family and taking care of him when he was five. He had a serious bone infection requiring surgery and his baby brother was taking a lot of his mother's time. They asked Mattie to help take care of him, since he needed special care. He stated that she was always so kind and patient, and loving and affectionate and that they bonded during this time. Buddy said that he and Mattie had a close tie as long as she lived, and that it still remains in his heart.

David joined the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) in 1934 and was sent to Greeneville, TN. His daughter Anne tells this about his time the CCC:

"While in the CCC, David took several courses including first aid, typing, surveying, and road construction. He also worked on the crew that was building the road, and on the right-of-way crew. In one of the letters he wrote to his mother, he said he was 'straw boss' for the crew he was on, meaning that whenever the boss was not at the job site, he was over the crew. He also worked in the Forestry Office and in the fire tower."

David was still in the CCC when he married Mattie on December 24, 1936. David's brother Bruce and Mattie's sister Annie had been married just a few years before. Their daughter Anne shared this story about their wedding day:

"David and Mattie Lou were married at the Presbyterian manse, just across the street from Don Harris' home. Mattie Lou's cousin, Christine Harris went across the street with them to be their witness. Dr. Bernard. H. Woodard was at the manse to see the preacher's wife who happened to be sick. He said 'What are you kids doing here?' When he found out they were getting married, he wanted to be a witness also."

After leaving the CCC, David and Mattie moved into a house on Porter Lane (now Hurt Road), where David worked as a sharecropper for the Kinnard farm and then the McMeen farm. They eventually had three daughters: Alice, Anne, and Margaret.

In 1945, David bought a store on Depot Street in Spring Hill from his sister Nell and her husband, and the family moved to Spring Hill to run the store. David would usually make a trip to Nashville twice a month to order merchandise to be delivered the next week. Mattie worked alongside David in the store. David sometimes worked as a backup mailman for Rural Route 1 to help out Don Harris (Mattie's Uncle). He would usually cover if Don was out for any reason. When Don got older he did not like bad weather, so David would go in his place. In the early 1950's, his family was worried when he got caught in a blizzard but fortunately he made it home okay. Around 1952, David's brother, Bruce, suffered a sun stroke while helping a neighbor fight a grass fire. When David found out that his brother could not farm anymore, he offered to let him buy into the store on Depot Street and told him he could run it because he was going to work at the Union Carbide Plant in Columbia. Bruce accepted the offer and moved his family into town.

Anne Dalton Pruitt (David and Mattie's Daughter) had this description of the store:

"Shoppers then were much different than today. They would either tell the clerk what they wanted or give them a list. They did not go all over the store. Most people only had one car per family so some of the ladies of the town would call in their grocery orders and either David or Bruce would deliver them. David or Bruce would buy a stalk of bananas which would hang to the left of the meat counter. The customer would tell them how many they wanted and one of the clerks would weigh them to know how much to charge."

Their niece Effie Dalton Heiss (David and Mattie's niece) gives this account of what the store carried and how it operated:

"In addition to grocery items, there was feed & seed, coal, jeans (overalls) work boots, hats....customers would tell Bruce what they needed and he would pick it up at Nashville wholesale. He usually made a trip twice a month to the wholesalers in Nashville. Other times, he could order from salesmen who came by on a regular schedule. Toys were always in the display window before Christmas. The children would come and leave their wish list for Santa and Bruce would pass it on to 'Mama' and 'Daddy.' Most toys were sold out every year. Bruce would sell at near wholesale cost just to help the families with their needs for Christmas. There were customers who ran on account from one tobacco crop sale until the next year's tobacco sale."

Many Spring Hill residents have fond memories of visiting the store. Bob Campbell remembers:

"As kids we would collect eggs from the wild chickens on our farm. Take them to Mr. Dalton who would candle them for us, and buy the good ones. He would give us store credit and could go in and buy a soft drink or penny candy. When my parents were busy with my older brother with cancer, she would call in her order and Bruce or David would bring it out to the farm. Awesome childhood memories in this place!"

As mentioned earlier, David went to work for Union Carbide in Columbia around 1952. Union Carbide was a chemical company that manufactured electrodes and opened a plant in Columbia, TN. Anne goes on to talk about David's employment at Union Carbide:

"David worked for Union Carbide starting in 1952 or 1953 and worked for 25 years before retiring. He worked at Union Carbide two different times. When they were building the plant they would take day workers and if they liked your work, you would be hired permanently. Each day men would wait outside the gate until someone would come out and pick the men that they wanted that day. The day he was picked he worked until lunch time, and since he had not brought anything to eat, he ran to Bernard Dodson's store and got some bologna and crackers and ate them as he walked back to work. He continued working there until the building of the plant was complete."

In 1985, David was elected as an alderman for Spring Hill and he was serving in that capacity during one of the most important times in Spring Hill history, the arrival of the Saturn car manufacturing plant. Naomi Derryberry served on the Board of Mayor and Aldermen with David:

"I first met Mr. Dalton as a neighbor. Moving from Nashville and an 'outsider' his family always made me feel welcomed. He gave me advice on my very first garden. Later we were colleagues on the Board of

Mayor and Aldermen. We had all just been elected into office when the announcement was made that General Motors was going to build a car plant south of Spring Hill. Mr. Dalton was determined, as all of us were, that the citizens of Spring Hill would not be overlooked in any ordinance that was passed. He always stuck to his convictions and did not hesitate to express them. I also remember his quiet laugh when he found something funny. He was such a gentleman, and it was an honor to know him." David served as an alderman until 1989.

David and Mattie lived out the rest of their days in Spring Hill. David died on May 12, 1996 from kidney failure. Mattie out lived David by almost 15 years and passed away on January 24, 2011 from Alzheimer's disease. They were buried side by side in the Spring Hill Cemetery.





Bruce and Annie Harris Dalton

Bruce Duncan Dalton was born in Theta, TN on August 9, 1912 and was the 4th of 5 children born to Robert and Ora Goad Dalton. His father ran a butcher shop in Theta and Bruce's boyhood home was on Knob Creek Road in Theta. His family later moved to a house on Maury Hill Street in Spring Hill. Bruce lost his father in 1928 and by 1930 just Bruce and his brother David were living with their mother on Depot Street. Bruce attended Spring Hill High School.

Annie Laura Harris was born on May 22, 1910 in the Port Royal community and was the 3rd of 4 children born to George and Ella Dodson Harris. Annie's mother died in 1914 from pregnancy complications, just a few days after her sister Mattie's birth and just a few months shy of Annie's 4th birthday. The 1920 census shows her and her sister Mattie living with their grandparents James and Laura Harris family home of "Brittain," that once stood just off of modern Jim Warren Road. After James and Laura passed away, the 1930 census shows them living with their Uncle Will and Aunt Lena Harris' family. Annie and her siblings all attended Greenwood School that once stood across the street from the modern address of 3597 Jim Warren Road.

One summer Bruce got a job working for one of Annie's neighbors. The two were introduced and began dating. They got married on June 27, 1934. The couple would eventually have two children, Effie and Bruce Edward "Buddy". The family moved to a house on Porter Lane (now Hurt Road) that sat on the west side of the road, just south of the modern intersection of Silver Cloud Drive and Brixworth Drive. Bruce worked as a sharecropper for Ed and Jodie Williams. The family had their own milk cows and Bruce would start every morning by milking the cows and setting the cans on the road. He would repeat the process for Ed Williams' cows, and the milk would be picked up and delivered to the Kraft cheese plant in Columbia. His daughter Effie remembers the family looking forward to their monthly milk check because the ten or twelve dollars they made was their only cash. After that Bruce would go about whatever he needed to do on the farm that day. If something required a second man to help, he would get Gene Langley, who lived where the Pipkins Hills subdivision is now, to help him and vice versa if Gene needed help. The family got along well with their neighbors and regularly had ice cream suppers in the community. Their daughter Effie said of that time:

"I cherish the memories of that place and those times. Even though we had little money and the luxuries of electricity and running water were not yet available, we always had enough food. And we had a home filled with love and laughter, rich with love, God's love, family's love, and the love of all our dear friends and neighbors."

In 1947 or 1948, the Dalton's bought a house on modern Lovell Lane off of Port Royal Road from Annie's uncle, Martin Dodson. Back then modern Lovell Lane and Clark Roads were connected. The construction of I-65 split the road in half. The Dalton house was on the south side of road and would have stood where the parking lot for Shining Light Gymnastics is currently located as of 2022. Their farm encompassed the area now known as the Parkway Business Center off of Old Port Royal Road. The family lived here for about four years. In 1951 or 1952, a grass fire broke out at a neighbor's house and all the men in the neighborhood gathered to try to contain it. In the process of fighting the fire, Bruce suffered a sun stroke. Doctors told him he needed to find a job working inside and that his days as a farmer were over.

E. L. Duncan was original builder of the store located next to the modern address of 2468 Depot Street. Duncan lived next door at 2474 Depot Street and operated the store until he retired. He then sold the store to Bruce's sister, Nell Dalton Kinnard, and her husband. They ran the store for a few years before selling the store to Bruce's brother David. About the time that Bruce had his sun stroke attack, David had decided to work at the Union Carbide plant in Columbia and asked Bruce to run the store. Bruce accepted and the two went into business together. They called their store Dalton Brothers General Merchandise, taking the name from their family's old business in Theta. Bruce ran the store and David would help when he was not working at the plant. After a few years, David sold his interest in the

business to Bruce but the store was always referred to as Dalton Brothers. Bruce and Annie's family lived a few houses down from the store at 2460 Depot Street.

Their daughter Effie gives this account of what the store carried and how it operated:

"In addition to grocery items, there was feed & seed, coal, jeans (overalls) work boots, hats....customers would tell Bruce what they needed and he would pick it up at Nashville wholesale. He usually made a trip twice a month to the wholesalers in Nashville. Other times, he could order from salesmen who came by on a regular schedule. Toys were always in the display window before Christmas. The children would come and leave their wish list for Santa and Bruce would pass it on to 'Mama' and 'Daddy.' Most toys were sold out every year. Bruce would sell at near wholesale cost just to help the families with their needs for Christmas. There were customers who ran on account from one tobacco crop sale until the next year's tobacco sale."

Anne Dalton Pruitt (Bruce and Annie's niece) also had this description of the store:

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The Daltons ran the store for 14 years.


Bruce had his share of health problems in his lifetime. Besides the sun stroke, he had in earlier life had surgery to remove a bone growth on his femur, today it would be called a tumor of the femur. When he registered for the draft prior to World War II, he put "scars on right leg" from the surgery as his "obvious physical characteristics that will aid in identification." Unfortunately, around 1964 a tumor was found on Bruce's brain. One of the neighbors helped run the store after his diagnosis. Bruce lived in four different facilities the last five months of his life. Annie could not drive so their daughter, Effie, moved back to Spring Hill to take help take care of him. Effie had been living in Mississippi at the time and her husband was able to sell their house and move everything to Spring Hill while she took care of Bruce. Bruce would pass away from the tumor on August 31, 1964.

The fall season following Bruce's death, people kept stopping by the store to pay their yearly bills to help Annie out. Gladys Dalton (Bruce's brother Luther's wife) took over operating the store but did not like running the business. The decision was made to close the store and David Dalton helped Annie close out the business in the spring of 1965. Even after the store closed, people still came by to pay off whatever debt they owed to Annie for their store account.

Annie remained in Spring Hill living with her daughter's family in the house on Depot Street. Annie would outlive Bruce by just over 23 years passing away on January 18, 1986 from a heart attack while she slept. Both Bruce and Annie are buried next to each other in the Spring Hill Cemetery. The store building is still standing on Depot Street and appears to be used as an extension of the house located at 2468 Depot Street now. The 13-acre lot where the Dalton's home once stood is now the Westview senior living community. The name Westview comes from a school that used to be on the property. All of the road names within the development are a tribute to the former owners: Bruce Drive, Harris Court, Dalton Circle.






