WHEREAS, the following vehicles are recommended to be either sold or donated: and





Department Budget Status:

I. Purpose/Overview: To dispose of older model police vehicles that are no longer in use due to year, mileage, and/or present condition.

II. Background Information: There are (5) five 2011 Chevrolet Impalas, (1) one Saturn Vue, and (1) one Nissan Xterra that was purchased from the drug fund. All vehicles are no longer in service. Some of the vehicles could still be used by a smaller agency, that would require some mechanical service. These vehicles would could be used by cities that cover a small area in square miles, by not being driven at high speeds, and general patrol driving. The funds from the Xterra would go back into the drug fund. The donated vehicle would be picked by the Watertown/ McKenzie LE personnel based on overall condition of the vehicle.

III. Financial Impact to Budget. Expected revenue generated \$3,000.00 to \$5,000.00

IV. Alternative Options: none.

V. Staff Recommendations: Due to condition of vehicles, advertise to auction on Gov Deals or donate to a Tennessee LE agency in need of vehicles.
